
The Wisconsin Heritage Parkway is Launched with Funding from the Region's Community Foundations

Nearly every community along the Fox and Wisconsin Rivers, and Lake Winnebago, has very deep historic and cultural heritage roots. The Wisconsin Heritage Parkway will be a unique new way to showcase our State's rich cultural heritage and strengthen our heritage tourism economy at the same time. With funding provided by several Fox River & Lake Winnebago Community Foundations representing Oshkosh, the Fox Cities, Green Bay, Fond du Lac and Green Lake, and other interested community organizations and individuals, the Friends of the Fox and the East Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission have partnered to prepare a report outlining how the Wisconsin Heritage Parkway can be established and implemented. The Wisconsin Heritage Parkway will promote the enjoyment of many heritage related recreational attractions, and allow them to be accessed by watercraft, by auto routes, and by persons traveling on bike tours, or others just out for an afternoon walk using waterfront pedestrian trails and venues consistent with the new urbanism concept.

Nearly 400 years ago, the Fox River was an important transportation corridor for Native American populations, living around Lake Winnebago, but European explorers mistakenly perceived it as the fabled "Route to the Orient". The Orient proved to be as elusive as ever, but early exploration left Wisconsin with a heritage as rich and colorful as any to be found on the east coast of North America.

In October of 2007 work got underway to rewrite the 10 year old Fox River Heritage State Parkway Concept Plan and update it to reflect the current visions of the Fox/Wisconsin River and Lake Winnebago communities. The revised plan is expected to be completed by mid-year 2008, when the 3 year project will shift to the implementation phase. The East Central Wisconsin RPC staff will provide assistance to communities, non-profit organizations, civic groups, and developers wishing to improve heritage related recreational opportunities along the Fox and Lower Wisconsin Waterways. The project has now secured over 70% of the needed funding and is continuing to expand participation from additional interested partners. The project will include pursuing designation as a National Heritage Corridor which would make the region eligible for Federal National Park Service funding.

AIS Committee Report

Many people are probably wondering what the Aquatic Invasive Species Committee is and what we are doing. This committee was set up by the Fox River Navigational Authority in 2005. Our goal is to develop a safe method to inspect, cleanse and transfer boats over the permanent invasive species barrier at Rapide Croche Lock without transferring aquatic invasive species. Additionally we are educating citizens of the Lake Winnebago Water Basin on how to prevent the spread of AIS.

In order to gain insight and help from different disciplines, the AIS Committee is made up of a diverse group of people. Members include Bill Bush FOF Vice President; Robert Stark, Chairman FRNSA; Harlan Kiesow, FRNSA CEO; Philip B. Moy, Ph.D. Fisheries and Nonindigenous Species Specialist University of Wisconsin Sea Grant Institute; Mike Arrowood, Chairman Walleyes for Tomorrow, Candice Mortara, FOF President and Project Manager Regional AIS Mgmt. Plan; and David Wentland, P.E. Coastal Engineer. (Previous members of the committee included Bill Willis, environmental fishing advocate and former FRNSA board appointee, Charles Verhoeven, WDNR Secretary designee to the FRNSA board, and Richard Sachs, former WDNR northeast Wisconsin AIS coordinator.) The group is also assisted by Bart DeStasio, Ph.D. Associate Professor Biology Department at Lawrence University. His team of college students have been actively monitoring for invasive species both above and below Rapide Croche.

Our past activities have included public outreach to a variety of groups for education and input into our transfer plan. Some of these groups include the Great Lakes Sports Fishermen, Tri County Powerboat Alliance, Walleyes for Tomorrow, the League of Women Voters and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. Future outreach and Public forums are planned to be held December 5 in Green Bay, December 12 in Appleton, December 13 in Oshkosh, January 7 in Fond du Lac and January 9 in Winneconne. The location of the forums will be announced in the near future. The input from these forums will be used to further develop our plan to inspect, cleanse and transfer boats at Rapide Croche. Once our transfer plan has been developed we will present it to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources for final approval.

Please watch for the location of these public forums. Further information on the public forums will be found in the local newspapers and on the websites of FOF and FRNSA. Your input is important to us.
